This project is due August 17, 2010 which will be counted as your child's first Language Arts grade. For every day that an assignment is late, that assignment will receive one letter grade off. Start early and pace your self .I will not accept assignments after Friday 19, August, 2010.

Directions:Read the Book Completely. The book reports should be typed or written neatly. No less than 3 full pages. Use 12 font, Times New Roman to type your report. If you write the book report by hand, do not double space or skip lines between sentences.

- 1. Your report must have the title of your book, your name, date, and author.**
- 2. Orally Retell the story by discussing in the report; the main characters, the setting, the plot, climax and conflict of the story.**
- 3. Presentations: KNOW THE STORY. Students will be asked questions to make sure they have read and understood the book they've chose. Speak loud & clear when presenting the report before the class. Practicing at home maybe helpful.**
